ROTARY HELPS ALENA BECOME A LEADER

FIJIAN PHYSIOTHERAPIST TAKES NEW SKILLS HOME, THANKS TO ROTARY AND INTERPLAST

Fijian physiotherapist Alena Lawena has taken a leadership role since returning home after her two-week placement in Victoria and Tasmania last September, generously funded by Rotary District 9685.

Alena joined physiotherapist Jenny Ball, with whom she had worked in Suva through Interplast's programs for three years, in Hobart, and spent some time at the Alfred Hospital's burns unit in Melbourne.

"I learnt so many new techniques about hand and burns management - splinting and rehabilitation," Alena said.

Thanks to Rotary, Alena's patients in Fiji are now benefitting from the skills she learnt in Australia, and she is passing them on to her colleagues through training sessions that she runs herself at the Colonial War Memorial Hospital in Suva.

"The head of Alena's department has noted a substantial improvement in her work ethic and skills following her training in Australia," said Interplast Programs Manager, Jess Hill.

"The department head informed us that Alena is now taking a leadership role in training the junior physiotherapists, who all undertake a rotation through the hand clinic where she teaches them about splints and compression garments," Jess wrote.

Alena has continued to work very hard upon her return, not only as therapist and a trainer, but also as a student.

"The biggest challenge was studying and trying to complete my Bachelor in Physiotherapy at the same time and attend to my daily clinics and also run In-Service Programmes for the physiotherapists," she wrote.

"Despite of all these challenges, from 2014-2015 the rupture rate from all the hand operations was only 1 per cent," Alena reported, adding that the physiotherapist to patient ratio was 1:15 per month.

"But at the moment, I am in desperate need of orthoplasts, which is the most important material for splinting," she added.

Alena's hospital has recognised her commitment and achievements, naming her Best Supportive Staff Member last year.

LIFE-CHANGING WORK AMAZES ROTARIAN

Rotary Club of Mornington member Geoff Gilsenan joined an Interplast trip to Nuku'alofa in Tonga in December last year.

Geoff accompanied the Interplast team as an observer, alongside two surgeons, an anaesthetist, a physiotherapist, a nurse and Interplast's Fundraising and Events Coordinator.

The team consulted 71 patients and performed 49 procedures in just eight days. "To complete the number of life-changing procedures in such a short time was amazing," Geoff wrote.

"Being present in the operating theatre during the procedures and having the surgeons clearly explain every step of their work was extremely rewarding," Geoff wrote. He was particularly impressed by the work of Interplast volunteer nurse, Sam Jervios, who has been on 12 programs including this one.

"Her organising of the theatres and rapport with the local staff was outstanding. She was able to locate anything the surgeons required without any fuss or panic," Geoff reflected.
